5 TAKEAWAYS FROM CHRIST'S 'TAKEN UP'

Jesus' Ascension was more than a return trip to heaven

The feast of the Ascension is an observance that does not seem to generate a lot of hoopla. But it should.

The Ascension is not simply Jesus' way of getting back to the Father. There's a lot more significance to the event in the life of Christ — and to the life of the Church.

Here are five takeaways as to why Jesus was "taken up" to heaven and what resulted from his Ascension.

1. He opened heaven to our human nature

By his bodily Resurrection and Ascension, Jesus brought his human nature into heaven and "opened the gates of heaven" for us. Just as by his rising from the dead he became "the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep" (1 Cor 15:20), so by ascending to heaven he became the first fruits of humanity to enter there.

This means that the just who had died before him were finally able to enter heaven. When Jesus died, he descended into "hell" — not the eternal hell, but "sheol," the "abode of the dead," where all who had died then resided. There Jesus preached to these souls, and those who believed in him were saved.

Since his Ascension, all who die are subject to particular judgment at death and immediately go to heaven, purgatory or hell. As he told his apostles, "When I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also" (Jn 4:3). Because he ascended with his human nature, we have a pathway to enter heaven too.

2. He would send the Holy Spirit

Jesus promised to send the Holy Spirit, the Comforter, the Spirit of Truth, to his apostles. The Holy Spirit would bear witness to him, dwell within them and "teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you" (Jn 14:26).

But Christ had to ascend to heaven to make this happen. He told them that "if I do not go away, the Counselor will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you" (Jn 16:7). That is what happened at Pentecost, ten days after the Ascension, when the Holy Spirit descended upon the apostles in the Upper Room and inspired them to go out boldly to preach the Gospel.

3. The work of the Church had to begin

Just before he ascended, Jesus gave his apostles the great commission: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Mt 28:19).

He had already given them the authority to celebrate the Eucharist and to forgive sins, and had instructed them to return to Jerusalem to await the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. When the Spirit came, on Pentecost, the evangelizing mission of the Church began, and some 3,000 were baptized that day.

The fledgling Church needed the power of the Holy Spirit, and Jesus had to ascend in order for the Holy Spirit to come upon the Church.

4. He remains present in the world in a new way

Even after the Ascension, Jesus is with us. The Church recognizes his presence in the Church, in the hearts of his faithful, in the sacraments, in Scripture and wherever his faithful are gathered. That's a mystical or spiritual presence. But his Real Presence — his body, blood, soul and divinity — remains with us in the Eucharist itself, in the elements of bread and wine consecrated by the priest. Jesus ascended to heaven, but his promise to remain with us is fulfilled most perfectly in the Eucharist.

5. Jesus ascended to return at the end of time

The work of the Church begun at Pentecost will not be completed until Christ returns in power at the final judgment. As the angel told the apostles as they stood staring into the sky after Jesus' Ascension, "This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven" (Acts 1:11).

That's something to reflect on as we celebrate the feast of the Ascension.

The Ascension

The death of a member of his family or of a loved friend, must be the saddest event imaginable in the life of an atheist. He is one who really is convinced that there is no God, no future life and therefore that the relative or friend is to turn into dust in the grave, never to be met with again. The thought that every day that passes is bringing him too nearer to that same sad fate, death, which will be the end of all his ambitions, all his enjoyments, the end of everything he thought he was or had, must be something hard to live with.



Thank God, we have the good fortune to know, and reason and faith convince us of this truth, that death is not the end of man. It is rather the real beginning. Today's feast—the Ascension of our Lord in his human nature—to his Father's and our Father's home, is the confirmation and the guarantee of this doctrine of our faith. We shall all rise from the grave with new, glorified bodies and ascend to heaven, as Christ did. There we'll begin our true life of eternal happiness.

While it is true that even for good Christians the death of a beloved one is a cause of sorrow and tears, this is natural as we still are of the earth earthly. Yet the certitude that our beloved one has gone to his true life and will be there to meet us when our turn comes, is always at the back of our minds to console and comfort us. What all human beings want is to live on forever with our dear ones. Death breaks that continuity but only for a little while. That break is necessary for the new life to begin.

It is only in heaven that this natural desire of an unending life with all those we love can be realized and death on earth is the door to that eternal life.

Look up to heaven today. See Christ ascending to his Father and our Father. Say: Thank you, God, for creating me, and for giving me, through the Incarnation of your beloved Son, the possibility and the assurance that if I do my part here, when death comes it will not be an enemy but a friend, to speed me on my way to the true, supernatural life which you have, in your love, planned and prepared for me.

It was written, and foretold, that Christ should suffer and so enter into his glory. The servant is not above the Master. I too must suffer. I too must accept the hardships and the trials of this life, if I want, and I do, to enter into the life of glory. Christ, who was

sinless, suffered hardship and pain. I have earned many, if not all of my hardships, by my own sins. I should be glad of the opportunity to make some atonement for my past offenses, by willingly accepting the crosses he sends me. These crosses are signs of God's interest in my true welfare. Through him he is giving me a chance to prepare myself for the day of reckoning, for the moment of my death which will decide my eternal future. For every prayer I say for success in life, I should say three for a successful death, a death free from sin and at peace with God.

Letter from Bishop Kirkpatrick

May 6, 2021 (St. Francois de Laval)

My Dear People,

Today is the Feast of St. Francois de Laval, the first bishop of Canada and the patron of Canadian bishops, an outstanding educator whose spiritual presence was widespread. It is on this day that a new third-party service for reporting situations of sexual abuse either committed or covered-up by a bishop has become available in our diocese and across Canada.

The Canadian Reporting System for Sexual Abuse or Cover-up by a Catholic Bishop is now linked to our website. Link and details are available at antigonishdiocese.com/responsible ministry.

Individuals can access the reporting system online (<u>BishopReportingSystem.ca</u>) or via a toll-free number (1-866-892-3737) from anywhere in Canada, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week in English or French. The system operates on a confidential, secure platform developed by ClearView Strategic Partners, allowing users to remain anonymous if they so choose, and ensuring all communications are documented and preserved.

The system is a direct response to Pope Francis' Apostolic Letter entitled Vos estis lux mundi (You are the light of the world). In this Letter, the Pope calls on dioceses throughout the world to establish "...one or more public, stable and easily accessible systems for submission of reports..." and standardizes the procedure for handling allegations. The reporting system for Bishops introduces an additional level of accountability for Church leadership in Canada to address reports according to both Church and civil law, alongside the existing diocesan protocols for reporting and responding to sexual abuse or other sexual misconduct by priests, deacons, religious, and mandated lay pastoral personnel. We welcome this system as part of our Responsible Ministry, because of Pope Francis' call and because it supports our efforts for safety and transparency, ensuring bishops themselves are accountable as are clergy, religious and laity working in our diocese.
